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Purpose of this Guide

The purpose of this guide is to build the knowledge of Integration Consultants supporting NC InCK Family Navigators on North Carolina’s key public health programs and services that are most important for supporting the needs of children enrolled in the InCK model. The guide focuses on resources located within and serving members within InCK’s 5-county service area and includes local health departments and federally qualified health centers.

Family Navigators looking to connect children with dental, immunization, and health care services; services for children with developmental delays or health care needs; or supports for new parents and young children may find this guide especially useful.

Key Programs and Services in Public Health

NC Local Health Departments: Locations, Service Offerings and Programs

Across InCK’s service area there are 4 local health departments providing services: Alamance, Durham, Granville/Vance and Orange County. For contact information for each local health department, please see [Table A-2 in](#) the Appendix.

Each local health department offers a variety of services. This section of the guide will review the most utilized services for children:

- Dental
- Health Promotion and Wellness
- Women Infant and Children | Nutrition

Dental Services

North Carolina offers “extensive” dental benefits to children with Medicaid coverage through local health departments. This category covers the widest range of dental care. Some of the procedures and services offered to Medicaid recipients in North Carolina include routine examinations, preventative services, basic and advanced tooth restoration, periodontal services, denture fitting and placement, and oral surgery.

Dental care that is deemed “medically necessary” is covered by Medicaid. This includes routine checkups for both adults and children. However, care that is deemed “experimental” is not covered by this policy. Full x-rays are covered once every five years, complete denture replacement is covered every 10 years, and partial denture replacement is covered every 8 years. North Carolina also does not place a limit on the total amount of dental care one individual can receive on an annual basis.

Health Promotion and Wellness

Women, Infants and Children (WIC) Program

The Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for **W**omen, **I**nfants, and **C**hildren (WIC) provides healthy food and health care support and is administered by local health departments. WIC includes vouchers for fruits and vegetables, infant formula, and other nutritious foods for infants and young children.

Family Navigators serving families with young children can inquire if the family they are serving receives WIC and support families in applying for and receiving WIC support to increase food resources for families using the links provided below.

WIC eligibility requirements

- Pregnant women
- Breastfeeding women who have had a baby in the last 12 months
- Women who have had a baby in the last 6 months
- Children up to 5 years of age
- Infants

Note on Income for WIC eligibility: A person receiving Medicaid automatically meets the income eligibility requirement. This means all children enrolled in InCK should meet income criteria for WIC.

CMARC: Care Management for At-Risk Children

CMARC is a statewide care management model run through local health departments that is available to children ages 0-5 who may benefit from additional support due to special health care, developmental or behavioral health needs. Some health departments still use the previous name for this program, CC4C on their websites. Services vary depending on the needs of the child and family but may include parenting support, referrals to medical care and connections to community resources for families in need of support with housing, food and other areas.

Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs)

As a Family Navigator, you may work with parents of children who do not have insurance and need linkage to medical services. This section will provide information about Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHC) and the resources available to children and their families by county.

What is an FQHC?

Federally Qualified Health Centers are community-based health care providers that receive funds from the Health Resources & Services Administration (HRSA) Health Center Program to provide primary care services in underserved areas. The center must meet a stringent set of requirements, including providing care on a sliding fee scale based on ability to pay and operating under a governing board that includes patients.

Federally Qualified Health Centers may be Community Health Centers, Migrant Health Centers, Health Care for the Homeless, and Health Centers for Residents of Public Housing.

Resources available through an FQHC

Health centers must provide comprehensive primary care and preventative health services for all age groups. Examples of types of services that must be provided directly by a health center or by formal arrangement with another provider include:

- Preventive dental services
- Screenings
- Immunizations
- Well child visits
- Referrals to specialty care providers
- Pharmaceutical services as appropriate
- Patient case management to establish eligibility for health and related services
- Transportation services necessary for adequate patient care

- Translation services for limited English speaking patients
- Health education of patients and the general population

Additional Public Health Resources

NCCARE360

Many of the Family Navigators within health plans and health systems will be familiar and trained on the [NCCARE360](#) tool. NCCARE360 offers one avenue for identifying service providers in a family’s area and making referrals for support. Family Navigators can make online referrals for a family within the platform and view the status of the referral over time. NC Medicaid is promoting the tool and continues to strengthen the network of providers and uses for care management support for families.

Types of service providers located on NCCARE360 include:

- Housing, Emergency rent assistance,
- Assistance with utilities (electric bill, water, gas, etc.),
- Food, Pharmacy, and Clothing assistance,
- Child care, Tutoring, Teen Talk, Support Groups, Counseling Services
- Adult literacy and Computer training centers, Work force Trainings, Financial education and Credit Counseling,
- Emergency Services available

NC 2-1-1

[NC 2-1-1](#) also has a robust search engine where Family Navigators and families can search for key services in their community. It is an information and referral service provided by United Way of North Carolina. Families and individuals in all 100 counties in North Carolina can call to obtain free and confidential information on health and human services within their community. Available in most languages, NC 211 is open 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year.

When an individual calls NC 211, a trained call specialist will conduct a search based on his or her geographic location to identify resources based on the caller’s current needs. In addition to contact information for the community resource, the call specialist will provide eligibility requirements, the intake process for a program, the hours of operation, any requirements for appointments, and accessibility information, when available.

- **Local Health Department (LHD):** Local health departments work to improve the health of people and communities in North Carolina. The Local Technical Assistance & Training Branch provides resources that support the work of local health departments, which include generalized nursing consultation, administrative consultation, training & technical assistance.
- **Division of Public Health (DPH):** The Division of Public Health promotes disease prevention, health services and health promotion programs that protect communities from communicable diseases, epidemics and contaminated food and water. [NCDHHS: Public Health](#)
- **DPH Women's and Children's Health Section:** The Women and Children's Health Section provides a variety of support and resources to agencies that include but are not limited to School Nursing Support, Camps for Children with Special Health Care Needs, Positive Parenting Program and Support Local Health Department Programs. - **Division of Health Benefits (NC Medicaid):** Starting July 1, 2021, most Medicaid beneficiaries began receiving the same Medicaid services in a new way called "NC Medicaid Managed Care." Beneficiaries choose a health plan and get care through a health plan's network of doctors. [Some beneficiaries](#) are remaining in traditional Medicaid, which is called NC Medicaid Direct.
